Affirmations for flute, clarinet, violin, cello and piano by Richard Wilson

My beleaguered friends, all too aware of a downcast and woebegone outlook, will appreciate the

struggle involved for me in writing a piece entitled Affirmations. This is the music of someone

whose chromatic style runs counter to current trends, who is approaching the age of fifty certain

that mental and physical decline wait just around that corner, who lost his father--only remain-

ing parent--in the course of writing the piece and thus became, overnight, the older generation.

What is there, amidst this graying obscurity, to affirm?

I am as enchanted with non-tonal sonorities as when I first heard Boulez's music thirty years

ago. Unlike Boulez, however, I believe that the differentiation of thematic material and its

recurrence, modified to varying degrees, provide necessary interest and coherence. I affirm a

kind of music that one can follow and remember. And I want it to have line and pulse--the

proverbial song and dance.

In the present case, the first movement is declamatory; the second, ironic; the third, wistful. I

have sought to bring the disparate timbres together in an uneasy rapport.
